WHAT HAPPENED TO BETA BLOCKER (BB) IN PATIENTS UNDERGOING NON-CARDIAC SURGERY?

Dr. Michael Carge (WSUGS 2022) Dr. Ashley Malach (WSUGS 2022) At the turn of the century, BB therapy was commonly used in higher risk elderly patients undergoing non-cardiac surgery. The frequency of use and the recommendation for use were so strong that it was identified as a quality issue that required documentation as to why it wasn't used when it wasn't used.

The POISE Trial, published in 2008, demonstrated that there was no decrease in 30-day mortality or long-term mortality in multiple coordinated prospective randomized trials, and there was an increase in postoperative stroke rate related to hypotension in those on BB therapy. Although there were a number of questions about the integrity of the Trial, their conclusions were accepted by most individuals, and BB therapy for non-cardiac surgery became infrequently used.


Ismail and co-authors presented an excellent paper at the 2021 meeting of the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma. These authors from Örebro, Sweden, looked at over 126,000 patients over the age of 65 who had hip fractures. They used the Revised Cardiac Risk Index (RCRI) to assess cardiac risk. The RCRI is a five-point system with one point each assessed for high-risk surgery, ischemic heart disease, congestive heart failure, cerebrovascular disease, and renal insufficiency. Since hip surgery is not considered high risk surgery, the patients in their study had a RCRI that ranged from 0 to 4. This non-randomized trial demonstrated that the most commonly used beta blocker was metoprolol, and beta blockade was associated with a decreased risk of myocardial infarction, heart failure, arrhythmia, and death, compared to those patients not on BB therapy. This significant (p<0.001) benefit was present for all of the four RCRI categories. The rise in mortality rate in the absence of BB therapy was quite impressive, ranging from 6.9% in the RCRI category of 0 to 53.6% in the RCRI category 4 in those patients without BB therapy, as opposed to a range of 2.3% in the RCRI category 0 patients to 8.8% in the RCRI category 4 patients in those patients on BB therapy. The authors concluded that there should be a relook at BB therapy for high risk patients undergoing non-cardiac surgery and that, in conjunction with such therapy, one should be aware that hypotension may occur and be associated with a risk of stroke. Maybe we should take another look at the prophylactic value of BB therapy in our high risk patients (J Trauma 2022;92:49-56).

12/19/70: Chief resident, Jose Azcarate; staff, Dr. G. Shannon

- 1. PF: GSW mouth and neck. Exploration left neck was negative.
- 2. JS: Perforated appendix. Treated with appendectomy.
- 3. CM: Rifle wound of abdominal wall and right wrist. Treated with debridement.

12/20/70: Staff, Dr. LeBlanc

- 1. BB: Blunt trauma of the abdomen. Treated with laparotomy, retroperitoneal hematoma on the right with laceration of the liver. Treated with choledochotomy.
- 2. JC: GSW abdomen. Treated with laparotomy, closure of small bowel perforations, resection small bowel, and exteriorization of perforation of the colon.

12/21/70: Staff, Dr. Birks

- 1. JB: GSW abdomen. Treated with laparotomy, suture laceration of the liver, closure perforation diaphragm, insertion right chest tube.
- 2. WA: GSW chest and abdomen. Treated with splenectomy, closure of stomach perforation.

12/22/70: Staff, Dr. S. Woods

- 1. EM: GSW abdomen with incarcerated left inguinal hernia. Treated with laparotomy, suture of liver laceration, cholecystostomy and repair of left inguinal hernia.
- 2. RH: GSW right arm with comminuted fracture. Treated with insertion of a rush rod, resection, and end-to-end anastomosis of the right brachial artery.
- 3. OCJ: GSW left lower chest. Treated with laparotomy and splenectomy for laceration of the spleen, closure of perforations of the stomach and diaphragm.
- 4. NT: GSW abdomen. Treated with laparotomy and ligation of transected right inferior epigastric artery.

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DOWN MEMORY LANE - Anna M. Ledgerwood, MD

12/23/70: Staff, F. Lippa

- 1. JR: GSW right arm. Treated with exploration brachial artery and repair of multiple perforations.
- 2. JE: Presacral abscess following a gunshot wound to the sacrum treated with extraperitoneal drainage.
- 3. JD #671: GSW abdomen with large laceration intrahepatic IVC, perforation of the diaphragm and massive right hemothorax. Treated with exploratory thoracotomy, and patient expired in OR.
- 4. FR: GSW chest and neck with fracture of sternum and right clavicle with transection right subclavian vessels and right common carotid artery and laceration innominate artery and aortic arch. Operation was exploratory thoracotomy, and patient expired in OR.

12/24/70: Staff, Dr. Friend

1. RD: GSW right arm, forearm, and abdomen. Treated with debridement of arm, saphenous vein graft of the brachial artery, exploratory laparotomy, closure of perforation of diaphragm.

12/25/70: Staff, Dr. A.J. Walt; chief resident, John Watts

- 1. EB: GSW back with through-and-through laceration of the right lobe of the liver, a 2.5-cm entrance and 2.5-cm exit, not bleeding. There was fracture of the pelvis of the right kidney with lacerations of the renal vein and artery. The operative procedure was right nephrectomy, cholecystostomy tube drainage for liver study.
- 2. PC: MVC with facial lacerations and acute abdomen with positive peritoneal lavage. Laparotomy showed through-and-through fracture of the left lobe of the liver just lateral to falciform ligament. Treated with left hepatic lobectomy and cholecystostomy tube drainage.
