

# PRODUCTIVITY A RISING STAR!!

Dr. Awni Shahait (WSUGS 2021) was born and raised in Jordan where he received his medical degree and did his internship and residency at the Jordan University Hospital. He finished his residency training in Jordan in 2015 and then came to the United States where he repeated his residency training in the Wayne State University program. During his residency years, he excelled aca-

demically and typically scored in the upper 90s on his in-training examinations. He received the Waldo Cain Award for academic excellence on a number of occasions and was awarded by the Detroit Surgical Association for presentation of a scholarly paper. He was identified as the Intern of the Year during his first year and received the commendation award for his work with the Southeast Michigan Continuing Medical Education program. During his residency years, he was involved with five clinical trials working in conjunction with different faculty members within the Department of Surgery.

After completing his training at Wayne State University, Dr. Shahait moved into the surgical program at the Southern Illinois University School of Medicine in Springfield, Illinois. He is currently an Assistant Professor there and will shortly rise in academic ranks based upon his productivity. During his residency years, plus the short period of time he has been a faculty member, he has had 28 publications, 13 case reports or published letters to the editor, and 15 abstracts which have been published.

A brief summary of two of his 2024 papers are presented. One of his papers is in **Updates** in **Surgery** and is entitled, "Critical View of Safety Approach Vs. Infundibular Technique in Laparoscopic Cholecystectomy, Which One is Safer? A Systemic Review and Meta-Analysis." His co-authors are Dr. Aburayya, Dr. Al-Hayk, Dr. Toubasi, and Dr. Ali.

These authors performed a meta-analysis on two types of approach for laparoscopic chole-cystectomy as it relates to prevention of bile duct injury. The critical view of safety approach entails complete clearance of adipose tissue in fibrous tissue in the hepaticocystic triangle, dissection of the lower one-third of the gallbladder from the liver bed, and subsequent

identification and isolation of only two structures, namely, the cystic artery and cystic duct, before any transection takes place. The second approach is the infundibular technique whereby the gallbladder is retracted upward at the fundus and laterally at the infundibulum. The surgeon then dissects the triangle of Calot anteriorly and posteriorly toward the gallbladder while identifying the cystic duct and tracing it to the gallbladder. The authors performed a literature search in order to identify which of the two procedures was the safest in preventing injury to one of the bile ducts. The authors demonstrated superiority of utilizing the medical view of safety approach as it relates to prevention of bile duct injury. They recommended additional studies in order to verify or contradict this conclusion.

A second paper that was recently published by Dr. Shahaitis entitled, "Evaluating the Utility of End-Tidal  $CO_2$  as a Predictor of Mortality in Trauma Victims: A Systemic Review and Meta-Analysis." His co-authors on this manuscript are Dr. Al-Aomar, Dr. Al-Samhori, Dr. Al-Zghoul, Dr. Al-Ghraibeh, Dr. Al-Majali, Dr. Tarras (WSGS 2011), Dr. Dolman (WSU/GS 2000/06), Dr. Tyburski (WSUGS 1992), and Dr. Mostafa.

These authors identified that end-tidal  $CO_2$  represents the maximum carbon dioxide pressure measured at the end of expiration. It is measured by capnography, and it has been reported in the treatment of injured patients that a level below 26 mmHg increases the risk of requiring a massive transfusion in patients with hemorrhagic shock. Some authors have advocated that end-tidal  $CO_2$  be used as one of the initial vital signs in patients with serious injury. The authors assessment provides predictive information of mortality in patients with traumatic brain injury or severe hemorrhagic shock. The authors concluded that the end-tidal  $CO_2$  and the PA  $CO_2$  minus the end-tidal  $CO_2$  gap does not conclusively predict mortality. The authors recommended future prospective studies in order to further define this issue.

The members of the Wayne State Surgical Society applaud the tremendous progress of Dr. Shahait and look forward to seeing more productivity each year.

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# EXCERPTS FROM THE LOG BOOK DOWN MEMORY LANE

#### 5/29/72 - Staff: Dr. C. Huang; Chief Resident: Dr. S. Sankaran

- 1. MM: 12yo with acute appendicitis, treated with appendectomy.
- 2. GS: 26yo female with GSW to abdomen, treated with laparotomy for thru-and-thru liver wound with transection of the anterior inferior border of right lobe which was sutured; thru -and-thru gallbladder, treated with cholecystectomy; iatrogenic injury to common bile duct, treated with repair and T-tube; GSW transverse colon with three holes which were repaired, and two holes cecum which were repaired and exteriorized as a cecostomy.

- 3. LK: 2yo with GSW of left upper quadrant abdomen and chest with left hemothorax, treated with a chest tube; injury to diaphragm, treated with repair; thru-and-thru left lobe of liver, treated with Penrose drain; thru-and-thru stomach, treated with repair of holes; and thru-and-thru spleen, treated with splenectomy.
- 4. ST: Bar glass window laceration right wrist with injury to flexor tendons of middle finger, which were repaired.

#### 5/30/72 - Staff: Dr. J. Plant

- 1. EW: 19yo with injury to left thigh, treated with debridement.
- 2. DH: 17yo with blunt trauma from steering wheel injury with rupture third part of duodenum, treated with repair.
- 3. LK: 2yo with GSW, treated with insertion of chest tube on left.
- 4. PR: 17yo with acute appendicitis, treated with appendectomy.

#### 5/31/72 - Staff: Dr. R. Birks

- 1 ET: I&D left arm abscess
- 2. JM: 45yo with stab left chest x4, treated with thoracotomy and repair of laceration of left lung (he did not have a heart injury although he had paradoxical pulse).

#### 6/1/72 - Staff: Dr. Threlkeld

- 1. SW: GSW right thigh with injury of femoral artery, treated with resection and anastomosis.
- 2. CO: 15yo with GSW abdomen with perforation duodenum, treated with repair; jejunem x4 treated with repair; aorta x2 treated with repair; IVC x2 treated with repair. There was iatrogenic right common iliac artery and vein injury, treated with repair.

DH: 21yo who is 2.5 days after perforated duodenal ulcer, treated with Omental patch.

#### 6/2/72 - Staff: Dr. A. Weaver

- 1. AB: Perforated duodenal ulcer, treated with Omental patch.
- 2. RH: Right neck abscess, treated with I&D.
- 3. EP: Postop patient who had vagotomy and pyloroplasty for upper GI bleeding developed wound evisceration, treated with closure.

#### 6/3/72 - Staff: Dr. Silva

- 1. MD: Large wound right leg, treated with split-thickness skin graft.
- 2. WH: GSW chest and abdomen and spinal cord with paraplegia T12 and right hemothorax, treated with right chest tube; thru-and-thru wound of liver, treated with suture.
- 3. JD: 62yo with aspiration, treated with bronchoscopy.
- 4. TS: GSW abdomen with thru-and-thru injury of splenic flexure of colon, treated with resection and reanastomosis and exteriorized (Dr. Kirkpatrick study).

#### 6/4/72 - Staff: Dr. Huang

- 1. HB: SGW left thigh, treated with split-thickness skin graft.
- 2. WH: Postop GSW chest and abdomen with paraplegia, treated with tracheostomy.
- 3. RW: Stab left lower quadrant abdomen with evisceration of small bowel, treated with closure of holes to the small bowel x2.
- 4. EJ: 12yo with GSW left thigh had exploration of femoral vessels, and they were intact.
- 5. MG: Incarcerated incisional hernia and partial small bowel obstruction, treated with reduction and repair.
- 6. DR: 25yo in auto accident with penetrating trauma to the abdomen, treated with left lower chest tube for subcutaneous emphysema, laparotomy with ligation of transected left inferior epigastric artery and repair of one hole in stomach.

#### 6/5/72 - Staff: Dr. Lucas

- 1. SW: Epigastric hernia with preperitoneal fat, treated with repair.
- 2. EW: S/P SGW to leg with ligation of femoral artery and vein and vein graft to the artery, treated with split-thickness skin graft.
- 3. JW: Patient in SICU 26 days postop for GSW cecum, ureter, common iliac artery, and small bowel with stress upper GI bleeding and peri-cecal abscess, treated with vagotomy, partial gastrectomy, gastrojejunostomy, decompression of small bowel and cecostomy, and resection right colon which was necrotic.
- 4. DP: Abdominal wall incisional abscess in patient six months postop cholecystectomy.
- 5. HO: Small bowel obstruction, treated with lysis of adhesions.
- 6. ST: Postop GSW left diaphragm and left colon with colostomy, had drainage of anterior subphrenic abscess.

#### 6/6/72 - Staff: Dr. Steiger

- 1. RS: Patient fell off an elevator shaft and had forehead laceration and intraoral bleeding of the tongue, compression fracture of L5, and fracture of pubic rami, left acetabulum, left femur, and torn ligaments of both knees, and fracture right tibia and fibula. Given 7 units of blood in the Emergency Department and had cardiac arrest. Taken to O.R. and had tracheostomy. Laparotomy showed cirrhosis of the liver. A cystogram and intravenous pyelogram were normal. He was given 24 units of blood in O.R. and died six hours postop.
- 2. EW: 32yo with multiple GSW, including left hand middle finger, treated with closure of wounds and splint; left chest and abdomen with injury to diaphragm, treated with repair, left lobe of liver which was not bleeding, lesser omentum, and left gastric artery which was ligated. The bullet went superior to splenic vessels, and there was a thru-and-thru wound of the aorta and left crus of the diaphragm, treated with repair. Patient required a thoracoabdominal incision.
